# **Course Description:**

A chronological and historical survey examining painting, sculpture and architecture beginning with prehistory to the 15<sup>th</sup> century of Western cultures. This course will focus on significant developments in the visual arts and their connection to and reflection of the political, religious and social influences at the time. In addition the course will consider how art can be referenced through a Christian worldview.

- 1. To see beyond the mere appearance and understand how the arts reflect worldviews including Christian and be cognizant of how the visual arts from the past are revealed in the contemporary world. **Assessment:** Weekly connection assignments and final project
- 2. To acquire an understanding of the language of the visual arts and to be able to use it in both a formal and research analysis of the works of art included during these time periods. **Assessment:** Weekly connection
- 3. To see beyond the mere appearance and understand how the arts reflect worldviews including Christian and be cognizant of how the visual arts from the past are revealed in the contemporary world. **Assessment:** Weekly connection assignments and final project
- 4. To acquire an understanding of the language of the visual arts and to be able to use it in both a formal and research analysis of the works of art included during these time periods. **Assessment:** Weekly connection assignments, formal analysis paper, research essay and final project.

# <u>Class Quizzes</u> 20 marks

Quizzes will be given each week. They will be based on the readings and lectures as well as in-class projects for that class. No makeup quizzes will be given. Each quiz is worth 2% of final grade.

# Weekly Connection Assignments 22 marks

Students will be required to select and include the images and details (title, date, artist, medium and collection) of one work of art from each lecture and one other work of art (student's choice) from a different time period and briefly describe, incorporating the appropriate visual language, the connection between these works (150-200 words). These assignments are due by the Thursday of the week following the last lecture. Students can submit on line up to 11 assignments. Each assignment is worth 2% of final grade

# Formal Analysis 13 marks

Students will be required to visit an art gallery and write a formal analysis of a work of art (student's choice) on display. A guideline will be provided for the students. **Due Date: November 23, 2015** (hard copy only at beginning of class)

## Research Essay 25 marks

Students are required to submit one research paper, with a title page, 12–point Times New Roman font, double-spaced with 1" margins and 2000 (minimum) to 2500 (maximum) words. Pages must be numbered and word count is to be included. Students will be required to submit 5 possible topics/subjects by **October 1, 2015 to the instructor on line**. Marks will be deducted from the final paper if the deadlines are not met.

- 1. **Topics** will be the student's choice and must be approved by instructor.
  - a. Final topics due: October 5, 2015 (in class).
- 2. **Bibliographic sources** (minimum 5-8) can be from print (books and periodicals but no encyclopedias) and non-print (on-line journals and/or scholarly websites) as well as photographs, photocopies, or scanned images of the art works discussed in the paper and all will need to be documented in MLA style.
  - a. Proposed Bibliography formatted correctly in MLA due: October 13, 2015 (online)

# **Research Essay (continued)**

- 3. Introductory paragraph and a sample paragraph (documented) (MLA) due: October 19, 2015 (online)
- 4. Final Paper due: November 9, 2015 at the beginning of class (hard copy only).

# **Final Project/Presentation**

#### 20 marks

This project will be an extension of the connection exercises that students are required to do weekly, their formal analysis and a continuation of their research essay. Students will use the subject of their essay research and connect it to an art piece (painting, sculpture or architecture) from their contemporary lives.

### Attendance:

Students are expected to attend and participate in all classes. Since the course will be covering a considerable content during the term and in order to be prepared for each class, students are expected review the material prior to each class (readings will be assigned). The class will be a combination of lecture, small group work, quizzes and the possible addition of films and/or a guest lecture.

#### Communication
