Course Description

New Testament Greek 3 is a reading course involving extensive reading in the Greek New Testament and further study of grammar, syntax and vocabulary. New Testament Greek 3 builds on translating and analysis skills learned in Greek 1 and Greek 2. In addition to reading and translating, the course focuses on building an intermediate-level understanding of Greek grammar and vocabulary. Prerequisite: GR 100, GR 101.

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of New Testament Greek 3, the student should be able to do the following:

- Apply the grammatical concepts from the assigned reading and those discussed in class (in addition to what was already learned in Greek 1 and 2).
- Know the vocabulary included in Lexical Aids for Students of New Testament Greek for all the sections up to and including words that occur 20 times or more.
- Read and translate the Greek New Testament with an intermediate level of competency, with special competency in the prologue of the John and Philipians.

Course Requirements

In order to complete this course successfully the student should do the following:

- Attend class and do the assigned reading concerning New Testament Greek grammar in Wallace and Hall. As there will be no formal lectures for much of this material, make sure you read through the material for the class it is assigned and be ready to ask for any points of clarification you may need. You will be asked to give definitions of grammatical terms from the assigned reading on the quiz for that class.

- Memorize assigned vocabulary sections from Lexical Aids for Students of New Testament Greek. The quizzes will test all vocabulary up to and including the assigned vocabulary for the day of the quiz (Greek to English).
- Complete the assigned translation and analysis of passages for the class they are due and hand in your work at the end of the class. Use the textbooks (and library tools where necessary) to accomplish the task. Though there are assigned readings from the textbook for each class, you should not limit your use of grammatical categories to those already introduced but explore and apply the whole of Hall and Wallace as you work through each translation. Be prepared to read, translate, and answer questions about the passage in class. A zero score will be assigned for the quiz if this work is not handed in at the end of the same class as the associated quiz.
- Complete daily quizzes. The quizzes will test all vocabulary up to and including the assigned vocabulary for that day (Greek to English). Points of grammar relevant to the translated passage will also be tested; you can refer to your translation work to answer these questions. In addition, you will be asked to give definitions of grammatical terms from the assigned reading from Wallace and Hall for that class. Quizzes will be graded on a scale of 10, each quiz contributing a possible 4% toward total grade for the course. There are 24 quizzes in total; only the 20 highest scores will be counted in calculating the grade. As noted above, the translation and analysis work must be handed in at the end of the same class or a zero score will be assigned for the quiz.
- Write a final exam of 3 hours duration in which you will be required to translate a paragraph of Greek and answer questions related to the passage.
