1. Course Description

This course will include a study of the biblical foundation for missions, related theological imperatives and a historical background of missions today. As well, students will consider the role of the church in missions and the development of individuals whose life-style is compatible with God's work in the world.

2. Course Objectives

- 2.1 To introduce the student to the biblical and theological foundations for world evangelization.
- 2.2 To encourage each student to become a World Christian in whatever task the Lord directs.
- 2.3 To acquaint the student with what God is doing in the world today and the task that still remains unfinished.
- 2.4 To examine a broad range of issues relating to the task of cross-cultural work such as the life and work of the missionary, the call, preparation for cross-cultural ministry, mission strategy, the challenge of unreached peoples, world-class cities, Bible translation, obstacles to overcome, opportunities and open doors.
- 2.5 To understand the significance of being a disciplined follower of the Lord Jesus Christ and the importance of intercessory prayer for global evangelism.

- 4.2 Missionary Biography / Autobiography Analysis: (20%)
 - 4.2.1 Selection Process: Select and read one missionary biography or autobiography found in our Library (see list at Circulation desk). Each book must have a minimum of 150-180 pages.

 NOTE Examine the book to make sure that it is the life story of someone and not a documentary of his mission methodology.
 - 4.2.2 Analysis of Book: Submit a five page analysis of the book you read making sure that you include the following:
 - 4.2.2.1 A presentation and evaluation of the historical-environmental factors that influenced the individuals background, personal development, attitudes and service.
 - **4.2.2.2** Describe the persons particular ministry and their results.
 - 4.2.2.3 Make note of the individuals strengths, weaknesses and abilities. Also note where they found strength for coping with the daily grind and what motivated them to serve God etc.

- 4.2.2.4 Make personal application from the principles or lessons evidenced in the life of the individual. How do those principles or lessons translate into your life.

- 4.3 Missions Term Paper: (30%)

 The student is required to research and write one 10

 page paper on some aspect of missions. The papers should reflect comprehensive research and understanding of the topic presented.

Each student should select one of the following topics, with the goal of increasing the student's awareness of the Global Mission of the Church.

- 4.3.1 Topics:
 - -"Tentmaking: Issues and Options for Today".
 - -"Muslim Evangelism".
 - -"World Class Christian".
 - -"A Biblical Perspective on the Lostness of Mankind".
 - -"Reaching the Unreached People Groups of the World".
 - -"Evangelism in the World Class Urban Cities".
 - -"My Plan for Keeping My Church Missionary".
 - -"Crucial Issues in World Missions During the Next Ten Years".
 - -"How Every Christian can be Involved in the Task of World Mission."
 - A Topic of your choice (It must be a contemporary mission's issue, sufficiently demanding to deserve your time and study.)
 - ***NOTE*** For a list of some reference books on missions, see the general reference section at the end of this syllabus.
- 4.3.2 Format: The paper is to be written according to either the American Psychological Association (APA) standards (see section 6.4 for a summary of the APA referencing system) or Kate Turabian Manuscript style.
- 4.3.1 Evaluation: Papers will be evaluated according to the following format:

1. PAPER EVALUATION

- A. Content. Purpose: does it fulfill the assigned purpose?
- B. Originality. Creativity.
- C. Organization. Structure of Paper.
- D. Style/Readability. Coherence of ideas: clarity of expression.
- E. Evidence of research & sources used. Use of resources, appropriateness, relevance, etc.
- F. Format. College standards of neatness, spelling, grammar, sentence structure, etc.

6. General Information:

6.1 Late work.

6.4.1 Citation of sources within the text

Method.

Author's name, year, volume number (if any) and page numbers, in parentheses within the text. If the author has already been named in the sentence, his name is not included in the parentheses, e.g. "These are Latourette's figures for all protestants in Japan" (1944:390-399). "Ibid." may be used if the respective work has been cited previously on the same page and the citation of no other work intervenes. DO NOT use op. cit., etc. Include the page number with ibid. if the page cited differs from the one in the previous citation.

Examples.

- Reference to the whole book: (Jones 1948)
- Reference to page(s) in the book: (Jones 1948:124)
- Reference including volume number: (Jones 1948: Vol 2, 98-100)
- Multiple-source references: (Jones 1948:124; Peters 1919:45; Smith 1972:5)

When an unknown article or report is cited, the creating agency should be listed in place of the author's name (e.g., India government of; London Missionary Society; Department of Health).

Abbreviations may be used (e.g. LMS for London Missionary Society), providing that an alphabetical list of such and what they stand for is supplied, either at the beginning of the paper or immediately prior to the bibliography.

6.4.2 Expansion of material in the text.

A brief note expanding something in the text, but out of the immediate flow of what is in the text, may be placed in an end-note section or at the bottom of the page. End-notes are numbered

consecutively throughout the paper. An asterisk may be used to make a note placed at the bottom of the page.
