## International Microfinance

This course will investigate the emerging field of microfinance - the provision of small loans and financial services to the poor – and its impact on addressing poverty in developing countries. Students will develop an understanding of a range of topics in the field, including: the role of credit in microenterprises, lending models, sustainability and best practices for microfinance institutions (MFIs), cultural factors and regional issues. The course offers a unique mix of theory and practice as students will have the opportunity to work on projects relating to current issues and microfinance programs in various regions of the world

Issues such as the role of profit, where microfinance fits in the overall picture of development and recent concerns raised about microfinance will be discussed. Other grassroots income generating initiatives such as microbusiness and social business will be considered, culminating in an analysis of the financial ecosystem that enables such activities. Specific *domestic* financial inclusion topics will also be briefly surveyed.

At the conclusion of the course, students may have the opportunity to participate in an international field visit to see first-hand how the work of partner NGO organizations is impacting the lives of individuals in one or more countries in Africa. Participation in the field travel is optional and not compulsory for completion of the course

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**Expected Learning Outcomes:**

- Understand the basic concepts of microfinance and the history of the industry
- Develop an understanding of the challenges clients face and why financial inclusion is necessary, from the perspective of the poor
- Understand a variety of new products and services emerging in microfinance, many involving new technologies
- Consider other initiatives focus on income generation in developing countries
- Critically evaluate the issues associated with the financial ecosystem such as lending models, interest rates, social collateral, cultural differences, government intervention, etc.
- Improve personal skills in research, analysis, writing and presentation

**Course Requirements:**

*Note – individual assignment instructions will be provided throughout the term for all assignments. The following is a summary only.*

**Geography Quizzes**

This is not a geography course but an understanding of basic world geography is necessary in order to speak intelligently about development issues and microfinance. Information on general world regions and specific countries will be referenced throughout the course.

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### ***MFI Grant Application & Presentation***

Each student (or pair of students if the students so choose) will pick a microfinance institution (from a list or which the instructor approves) to complete a grant application for and briefly present on for purposes of seeking funding for that MFI.

### ***Research Report***

A core aspect of the course will be the development of a research consulting report that outlines challenges and recommendations for various aspects of microfinance programs in the field. As part of this report, students will select specific topics and work in teams of 2-3 throughout the semester to research and develop their reports. The work may include documenting existing programs that have been established, researching alternative best-practices to enhance delivery and implementation, and/or analysis of cultural aspects and variables in different regions around the world. Acting as consultants, students will develop a practical understanding for working in business teams, managing project timelines and completing deliverables for a major project. Students are encouraged to take initiative wherever possible in the generation of ideas and will be expected to contribute their own unique skills and strengths to the development of the consulting report. A presentation to the class will be made at the end of the term.

### ***Round Tables & Reflections***

Students will be expected to participate in a number of round table discussions on various topics and issues throughout the term. These may take place in class or through an on-line forum. Reflections will include a scripture reflection in the area of poverty & compassion and a reflection on two or more sessions from the Soul of the Next Economy Forum.

### ***Midterm & Final Exam***

Guidance on possible exam questions will be provided in class throughout the term.

### **Submission of Assignments:**

All written assignments are to be submitted on Moodle. Failure to submit an assignment without legitimate reason (i.e. evidenced illness) or prior approval of the instructor may result in a failed grade for the course. In the case of legitimate or approved absence, and at the instructor's discretion, the assigned date may be rescheduled to a later date, or if this is not practically possible, the marks reallocated to other components of the course grade.

Assignments should be handed in by the time and date due and students will typically find they are better able to balance their different courses and other commitments if they abide by the due dates. However, unless otherwise advised, late assignments worth 10% or more of the course grade will be accepted up to two days following the due date on the following terms:

- Up to one day late = 15% penalty (this begins right after the time due)
- One-two days late = 30% penalty

### **Attendance & Participation:**

Each student is expected to regularly attend and actively participate in classroom discussions and any on-line discussion forums assigned. Group discussions and analysis of course topics will be a key component of learning throughout the term. Students are expected to attend all classes, having prepared for class by reading the assigned readings ahead of time and actively participate in group discussions. The skills needed to participate effectively in class and present your ideas are the same skills required to be effective in the business world. If external circumstances or illness prevent you from attending or adequately preparing for a class, please let the professor know. The instructor may reduce a student's mark by a letter grade (i.e. B to B-) if a student's participation is inadequate (in addition to the direct effect on the round table portion of the grade). **Students are to be on time for class and refrain from the use of electronics with the**

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**exception of tablets or laptops for note-taking or direct classroom activities. The use of electronics for personal activities is not permitted – out of respect for fellow classmates and the instructor.**

To pass the course, students must achieve an overall grade of at least 50%. Final grades will be available on your student portal.

**Policies:**

All students have received an Ambrose e-mail account upon registration. Please consult the List of Important Dates. Withdrawal from courses after the Registration Revision period will not be eligible for tuition refund. A grade of “W” will appear on the student’s transcript.

Students wishing to withdraw from a course, but who fail to do so by the applicable date, will receive the grade earned in accordance with the course syllabus. A student obliged to withdraw from a course after the Withdrawal Deadline because of health or other reasons may apply to the Registrar for special consideration.

Students, who find a conflict in their exam schedule must submit a **Revised Examination** Request form to the Registrar’s Office by the deadline date, please consult the List of Important Dates. Requests will be considered for the following reasons only: 1) the scheduled final examination slot conflicts with another exam; 2) three final exams within three consecutive exam time blocks; 3) the scheduled final exam slot conflicts with an exam at another institution; 4) extenuating circumstances. Travel is not considered a valid excuse for re-scheduling or missing a final exam.
